From the director's notebook:

My motivation in writing "Sandwiched" and bringing it to life is to expose audiences to a story about the heroism and challenges of the caretaker role – which is almost always filled by a woman. The play is intended to be thought provoking. It suggests that caretakers can redefine their role within the family so that the value of the caretaker's life is equal to the value of the other family members.

I choose to define heroism as "a self-sacrificing choice acted out on behalf of others." Heroism is typically thought of as something dramatic such as jumping into the water or dashing into a burning building to save someone. We read about or watch movies about a person who leads a group out of great danger. Sometimes the heroes survive; sometimes they do not. We celebrate this kind of heroism. But the heroism of caretakers happens differently and most of the time the caretaker is a woman who sacrifices the moments, hours, days, months and years of her life to provide solace, support and even life itself to the people in her care. This kind of heroism often goes unrecognized, except maybe on Mother's Day. As a rule the efforts of the caretaker are noticed only when they stop.

People who have filled the role of caretaker know exactly what I am talking about. People who have not filled that role do not fully understand what it means to consistently ignore your own needs, day after day, on behalf of others and to have your efforts largely unappreciated.

In this play we see that Bonnie finds ways to redefine her role so that she is less 'sandwiched' by family demands. She finds solutions to help herself have a life of her own and she puts them into action. Enjoy – reflect – take action.


